

February 29. Michael Gorman, brakeman on coal train; arm caught between bumpers while coupling cars at Ararat Summit, and broken between elbow and wrist.

March 7. Christian Rabbitt, a boy about 14 years old, trying to get on a trip of cars while moving up No. 13½ plane, Honesdale, fell, and one car truck passed over his leg crushing it badly.

January 5. Cornelius Brown, stealing a ride on a coal train; jumped from the train while in motion, and had one leg crushed below the knee.— Nathan Moyer, engineer; Edward Murta, conductor.

January 24. William Cole, walking on the track near Ashley, was struck by an engine and instantly killed. Cornelius Riley, engineer; John Bennett, conductor.

January 26. Charles A. Brader, with two boys, George and David Tasker, driving across at Miner's station, were struck by engine of express train, killing Brader and seriously injuring George Tasker. The other boy escaped unhurt. The accident was the result of carelessness on the part of Brader, as parties who saw the train approaching endeavored to prevent his crossing. J. N. Smith, engineer; C. E. Starr, conductor.

January 28. Mary Shoenberger, walking on the track near Laubach station, on the evening of this date, was struck by engine of express train and fatally injured. George Winterstein, engineer; Moses Huff, conductor.

March 6. John Rinker, brakeman, was struck by engine of his train, receiving injuries which terminated fatally same day. Train broke in two near Hope's station, and engine crossed over and ran down south track after rear portion of train. Rinker stepped on south track in front of engine, and was struck as above. S. R. The passenger killed received the injuries causing his death by jumping from a train, while in motion, at Bethlehem, October 20, 1876.

The fourteen passengers were injured as follows: At or near midnight, on April 10, 1876, near Barn Door siding, a passenger train ran into a rock lying on the track—the train was thrown from the track, and six (6) passengers injured.

On July 17, 1876, near Shenandoah, the breaking of a truck under a baggage car, threw the car from the track injuring two (2) passengers.

At or near midnight of August 31, 1876, near Laury's, the breaking of an axle under the tender of a passenger train, threw part of the train from the track, injuring six (6) passengers. Nearly all the above injuries were slight.

The fourteen (14) employees were killed in the following manner: Four by jumping or falling from train; two struck by wall or bridge; three struck on track by train or engine in motion; one run over while working under train; three caught between cars or parts of train; one fell under hand car.

The forty-two (42) employees were injured as follows: Twelve while coupling cars; one by falling through a bridge; three struck on track by car or engine in motion; four by train running into a rock; four by falling under train in motion; three by jumping from engine or train in motion; one

thrown from cars in motion; four by falling from engine or cars; one struck by timber falling from car; seven by collision of trains; one struck by bridge; one while getting engine on track.

The nineteen (19) others were killed as follows: Three while riding on coal trains, contrary to the rules of the company; ten while walking on the track; four while crossing track ahead of trains; two while intoxicated and sitting or lying on track.

MY DEAR SIR:—I forward report, with explanation of changes from last year's statement, as per account enclosed.

In statement made last year, the return was in accordance with the treasurer's understanding of "Supplement, approved February 10, 1852," which states that the president and managers of the Sunbury and Erie railroad company be and are hereby authorized to pay to the shareholders entitled to receive the same, in the months of January and July in each year, interest, at the rate of 6 per centum per annum, on all instalments paid by them after the passage of this act, *and continue to pay the same till the road shall be completed, and the profits or earnings of the said railroad, within the same time, shall be credited to the cost of construction, and all interest paid shall be charged to the cost of construction.*

On examination, the management have determined that, although in strict phraseology a railroad is never completed, a proper construction of the act would be, that the road, according to the true intent of the act, is now completed; consequently the system has been changed, and a return made in accordance with their decision, and the statement enclosed to explain change.

Meeting of January 15, 1867. " This lease requires the cancellation of all claims existing between the two companies, and the transfer of all horses, cars and other property, including the cash on hand on the 31st of December last to this company, and in consideration of which, and for the use of the road built and the exercise of their franchise, this company agrees to pay to the stockholders of the Schuylkill River railroad a dividend of 50 cents per share per annum upon their stock less United States and State taxes, with the privilege to the stockholders of that company of investing their stock at any time during the existence of the lease into stock of this company at the rate of 5 shares for 1, that being the amount actually paid in by each, viz : \$5 per share on the Schuylkill River railroad, and \$25 per share on this stock.

The lease was executed on the 29th of December, 1866. All the stock originally issued of the Schuylkill River road has been converted into stock of the Philadelphia and Gray's Ferry road except 190 shares.

Market street and Chestnut and Walnut street railways for Zoological Garden, Race and Vine and Girard avenue railways.

The Centennial Narrow Gauge Line. This company constructed and operated a double track narrow gauge railroad within the International Exhibition grounds; this line traversed the entire circle, from building to building, a distance of nearly three and one-half miles of double track, or nearly seven miles of single track, providing rapid transit by steam power, and conveying passengers to all parts. The trains began running on the 15th day of May, 1876, and were operated during the exhibition. There were three millions eight hundred and eighteen thousand eight hundred and ninety-two (3,818,892) passengers carried in the cars from May 15 to November 11, 1876, without injury or the loss of a single life.
